5. My turtle, **which** is my favorite pet, loves to swim in the pond.

6. The bee **that** flew in the window stung Julie on the arm.

7. My dad's favorite actor, **whom** I've never heard of, is going to be on television tonight.

8. I read ten books this summer, all of **which** I could tell you about.

9. My best friend, **whose** video game I borrowed, let me play the game first.

10. My friend, **whom** we saw at the store, followed us home.

11. The choir teacher will choose the students **who** will be in the school play.

12. My friend, **whom** everyone loves, invited the whole class out to have pizza.

13. My grandmother, **whose** desserts are mouthwatering, makes the best apple pie in the county.

14. My friend John, from **whom** I borrowed a pencil, helped me with my homework.

15. The artist, **who** painted a portrait of my family, is a guest speaker in class today.
